#### INTRODUCTION TO THE DAY

The fourth of the Old Testament promises providing a baptismal lens this Lent is the promise God makes to Moses: those who look on the bronze serpent will live. In today's gospel Jesus says he will be lifted up on the cross like the serpent, so that those who look to him in faith will live. When we receive the sign of the cross in baptism, that cross becomes the sign we can look to in faith for healing, for restored relationship to God, for hope when we are dying.

## **GATHERING**



P: God, who is rich in mercy, loved us even when we were dead in sin, and made us alive together with Christ. By grace you have been saved. In the name of + Jesus Christ, your sins are forgiven. Almighty God strengthen you with power through the Holy Spirit, that Christ may live in your hearts through faith. **A: Amen.**

## **WORD**

## FIRST READING: NUMBERS 21:4-9

The first readings for Lent this year focus on the succession of covenants God has made. This week we hear of the healing of Israel after a curse, using the bronze image of a snake. This statue was one of the things, together the stone tablets with the Ten Commandments, enclosed in the Ark of the Covenant.


<sup>4</sup>From Mount Hor [the Israelites] set out by the way to the Red Sea, to go around the land of Edom; but the people became impatient on the way. <sup>5</sup>The people spoke against God and against Moses, "Why have you brought us up out of Egypt to die in the wilderness? For there is no food and no water, and we detest this miserable food." <sup>6</sup>Then the Lord sent poisonous serpents among the people, and they bit the people, so that many Israelites died. <sup>7</sup>The people came to Moses and said, "We have sinned by speaking against the Lord and against you; pray to the Lord to take away the serpents from us." So Moses prayed for the people. <sup>8</sup>And the Lord said to Moses, "Make a poisonous serpent, and set it on a pole; and everyone who is bitten shall look at it and live." <sup>9</sup>So Moses made a serpent of bronze, and put it upon a pole; and whenever a serpent bit someone, that person would look at the serpent of bronze and live.

## PSALM 107:1-3, 17-22

(Sung to the tune George's Windsor ELW 693)

This psalm tells a series of stories about how God has rescued and redeemed Israel when they fell away – an important dynamic for our Lenten consideration. This section of the psalm refers particularly to the today's First Reading





Some were fools with rebel ways; for their sins, in woe were left; They abhorred all kinds of food; and drew near the gates of death. Then they cried out to the LORD, in their trouble and distress; He sent forth His word and healed, rescued them in faithfulness.

Let them give thanks to the LORD, for His steadfast, cov'nant love, And His wondrous deeds for them, sent unfailing from above. Let them sacrifice with praise, and with thanks their off'rings make, Tell of all His works always, sing with joy for His name's sake.

## **SECOND READING: 1 CORINTHIANS 1:18-25**

Ephesians seems to have been written at least in part to bridge the developing divide between Jewish and Gentile Christians. Like Paul does in Romans, the author of Ephesians argues that both Jews and Gentiles have fallen into sin and rebellion, and are rescued by God's action in Jesus, a dynamic which echoes todays First Reading and is echoed again in the Gospel.


¹You were dead through the trespasses and sins ²in which you once lived, following the course of this world, following the ruler of the power of the air, the spirit that is now at work among those who are disobedient. ³All of us once lived among them in the passions of our flesh, following the desires of flesh and senses, and we were by nature children of wrath, like everyone else. ⁴But God, who is rich in mercy, out of the great love with which he loved us ⁵even when we were dead through our trespasses, made us alive together with Christ—by grace you have been saved—⁶and raised us up with him and seated us with him in the heavenly places in Christ Jesus, ⁵so that in the ages to come he might show the immeasurable riches of his grace in kindness toward us in Christ Jesus. ⁵For by grace you have been saved through faith, and this is not your own doing; it is the gift of God—⁵not the result of works, so that no one may boast. ¹oFor we are what he has made us, created in Christ Jesus for good works, which God prepared beforehand to be our way of life.

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## \*GOSPEL READING: JOHN 3:14-21

Because Lent points us toward Holy Week, the Gospel readings this year collect Jesus' predictions of his own suffering and death. During his secret nighttime conversation with the Jewish official Nicodemus, Jesus uses the First Reading to prefigure his own death – a theme he will return to in John 12.

P: The Holy Gospel according to Saint John, the third chapter. A: Glory to you, O Lord.

[Jesus said:] <sup>14</sup>"Just as Moses lifted up the serpent in the wilderness, so must the Son of Man be lifted up, <sup>15</sup>that whoever believes in him may have eternal life.

<sup>16</sup>"For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life.

<sup>17</sup>"Indeed, God did not send the Son into the world to condemn the world, but in order that the world might be saved through him. <sup>18</sup>Those who believe in him are not condemned; but those who do not believe are condemned already, because they have not believed in the name of the only Son of God. <sup>19</sup>And this is the judgment, that the light has come into the world, and people loved darkness rather than light because their deeds were evil. <sup>20</sup>For all who do evil hate the light and do not come to the light, so that their deeds may not be exposed. <sup>21</sup>But those who do what is true come to the light, so that it may be clearly seen that their deeds have been done in God."
