# **GATHERING**

### \*CONFESSION AND FORGIVENESS

P: In the name if the Father, and of the +Son, and of the Holy Spirit. A: Amen.

P: Let us pray: Almighty God, to whom all hearts are open, all desires known, and from whom no secrets are hid: cleanse the thoughts of our hearts by the inspiration of your Holy Spirit, that we may perfectly love you and worthily magnify your holy name, through Jesus Christ our Lord. **A: Amen.** 


P: If we say we have no sin, we deceive ourselves, and the truth is not in us. But if we confess our sins, God who is faithful and just will forgive our sins and cleanse us from all unrighteousness.

P: Let us confess our sin, in the presence of God and of one another.

P: Gracious God, have mercy on us. We confess that we have honored you with our lips, but have harmed our neighbors with our tongues. The cravings at war within us cause conflicts and disputes. In our desire to be first we make distinctions among ourselves. We place the needs of the poor and the suffering last. In your great mercy, forgive us our sins. Draw near to us with grace in time of need, and turn us to follow in the way of Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord. Amen.

P: In the mercy of almighty God, Jesus Christ was given to die for us and for his sake God forgives us all our sins. As a called and ordained minister of the church of Christ, and by his authority, I therefore declare to you the entire forgiveness of all your sins, in the name of the Father, and of the + Son, and of the Holy Spirit. **A: Amen.**

# WORD

# FIRST READING: JOB 42:1-6, 10-17

For the last several weeks we have been reading through the book of Job, a righteous man who lost everything, but (despite the arguments of his friends and family) refused to say that it was because he had sinned. He demanded that God explain how these things happen; God responded by accepting his anger, but declaring that such explanations were beyond human comprehension.

Therefore I have uttered what I did not understand, things too wonderful for me, which I did not know.

<sup>6</sup>therefore I despise myself, and repent in dust and ashes."


<sup>10</sup>And the LORD restored the fortunes of Job when he had prayed for his friends; and the LORD gave Job twice as much as he had before. <sup>11</sup>Then there came to him all his brothers and sisters and all who had known him before, and they ate bread with him in his house; they showed him sympathy and comforted him for all the evil that the LORD had brought upon him; and each of them gave him a piece of money and a gold ring. <sup>12</sup>The LORD blessed the latter days of Job more than his beginning; and he had fourteen thousand sheep, six thousand camels, a thousand yoke of oxen, and a thousand donkeys. <sup>13</sup>He also had seven sons and three daughters. <sup>14</sup>He named the first Jemimah, the second Keziah, and the third Keren-happuch. <sup>15</sup>In all the land there were no women so beautiful as Job's daughters; and their father gave them an inheritance along with their brothers. <sup>16</sup>After this Job lived one hundred and forty years, and saw his children, and his children, four generations. <sup>17</sup>And Job died, old and full of days.



# **PSALM: 46**

(sung to the tune Third Mode Melody ELW 332)

This psalm was the inspiration for "A Mighty Fortress," Luther's most famous hymn. The first several verses have also provided connections with the Wartburg, the castle in which Luther took refuge after being condemned by the emperor. The whole psalm sums up very well the work of the Word and the Spirit in the thinking of the Reformers – providing both sustenance and safety.





### **SECOND READING: HEBREWS 7:23-28**


One of the themes of the book of Hebrews is how Jesus fulfills and brings to an end the sacrificial system which, until the Incarnation, had been how humans (Israel in particular) interacted with God. The author argues that that system and the priesthood which led it were pale reflections of the true intermediary between human and divine, foretastes of the feast to come.

<sup>23</sup>The former priests were many in number, because they were prevented by death from continuing in office; <sup>24</sup>but he holds his priesthood permanently, because he continues forever. <sup>25</sup>Consequently he is able for all time to save those who approach God through him, since he always lives to make intercession for them.

<sup>26</sup>For it was fitting that we should have such a high priest, holy, blameless, undefiled, separated from sinners, and exalted above the heavens. <sup>27</sup>Unlike the other high priests, he has no need to offer sacrifices day after day, first for his own sins, and then for those of the people; this he did once for all when he offered himself. <sup>28</sup>For the law appoints as high priests those who are subject to weakness, but the word of the oath, which came later than the law, appoints a Son who has been made perfect forever.

# \*GOSPEL READING: MARK 10:46-52


This passage comes between Jesus' third prediction of his passion and resurrection and his triumphal entry into Jerusalem (which we read on Palm Sunday). Bartimaeus' cry is, in Greek, "Kyrie eleison" – "Lord, have mercy," the prayer with which we often begin our service. As usual in the Gospels, it is a plea for healing, rather than for forgiveness.


P: The Holy Gospel according to Saint Mark, the tenth chapter. **A: Glory to you, O Lord.** 

<sup>46</sup>As [Jesus] and his disciples and a large crowd were leaving Jericho, Bartimaeus son of Timaeus, a blind beggar, was sitting by the roadside. <sup>47</sup>When he heard that it was Jesus of Nazareth, he began to shout out and say, "Jesus, Son of David, have mercy on me!" <sup>48</sup>Many sternly ordered him to be quiet, but he cried out even more loudly, "Son of David, have mercy on me!" <sup>49</sup>Jesus stood still and said, "Call him here." And they called the blind man, saying to him, "Take heart; get up, he is calling you." <sup>50</sup>So throwing off his cloak, he sprang up and came to Jesus. <sup>51</sup>Then Jesus said to him, "What do you want me to do for you?" The blind man said to him, "My teacher, let me see again." <sup>52</sup>Jesus said to him, "Go; your faith has made you well." Immediately he regained his sight and followed him on the way.

L: Eternal Servant, grant vision and wisdom to the church so that those who are in need are not ignored. May the command of Jesus to love our neighbor sharpen our focus for work in the kingdom. God of grace, **A: hear our prayer.**

L: Eternal Hope, may the legacy of the saints inspire us every day. We especially remember those in our congregation who have gone before us, like Wayne Calvin Shearburn, Mark Kolesar, Judy Kocher, Geraldine Kline, and Helen Rudolph, our former organist. We hold fast to the promise that we will be together in your presence forever. God of grace,





# Give us this day our daily bread;


and forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us; and lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil.






