INTRODUCTION TO THE DAY

Advent is about the "coming days." God's people have always lived in great expectation, but that expectation finds specific, repeated enunciation in the texts appointed for these four weeks. The ancients anticipated a "righteous Branch to spring up for David." The Thessalonians awaited "the coming of our Lord Jesus with all the saints." Jesus' contemporaries hoped for the time "to stand before the Son of Humanity." With them we eagerly await the coming days: another Christmas celebration, a second coming, and the advent of Christ in word and supper.

GATHERING

*CONFESSION AND FORGIVENESS

P: Blessed be the holy Trinity, + one God, alive in the world, reviving creation, arriving soon. **A: Amen.**

P: Let us confess our sin, in the presence of God and of one another.





FIRST READING: JEREMIAH 33:14-16

The disaster which Jeremiah had foreseen was taking place. Judah and her allies had been defeated by Babylon, and its king – the descendent of David -- and other leaders taken into exile. Now Jerusalem itself was under siege, and its destruction imminent. At this darkest of times, when all were giving up hope, Jeremiah, the prophet of woe, abruptly changed his tune


¹⁴ The days are surely coming, says the LORD, when I will fulfill the promise I made to the house of Israel and the house of Judah. ¹⁵ In those days and at that time I will cause a righteous Branch to spring up for David, and he shall execute justice and righteousness in the land. ¹⁶ In those days Judah will be saved, and Jerusalem will live in safety. And this is the name by which it will be called: "The LORD is our righteousness."

PSALM: 25: 1-10

This psalm may be seen as the song of Jeremiah's audience – finally convinced of the error of their ways and hoping beyond hope that God would be faithful to them, despite their past sins.



SECOND READING: REVELATION 21:1-6A


In this, the oldest writing of the New Testament, Paul makes it clear that he expects that the return of Christ, with the Last Judgment and the renewal of the world, will happen soon.

⁹ How can we thank God enough for you in return for all the joy that we feel before our God because of you? ¹⁰ Night and day we pray most earnestly that we may see you face to face and restore whatever is lacking in your faith.

¹¹ Now may our God and Father himself and our Lord Jesus direct our way to you. ¹² And may the Lord make you increase and abound in love for one another and for all, just as we abound in love for you. ¹³ And may he so strengthen your hearts in holiness that you may be blameless before our God and Father at the coming of our Lord Jesus with all his saints.

*GOSPEL ACCLAMATION



*GOSPEL READING: LUKE 21:25-36

Every year the Gospel for the first Sunday of Advent is from the end of the year's Gospel, as Jesus before his Passion teaches his followers about the impending end of time and the return of the Son of Man. In all of these readings, he warns them to be ready for that return at any moment since, even with signs, it will be sudden and unexpected

P: The Holy Gospel according to Saint Luke, the twenty-first chapter. **A: Glory to you, O Lord.**

[Jesus said:] ²⁵ "There will be signs in the sun, the moon, and the stars and on the earth distress among nations confused by the roaring of the sea and the waves. ²⁶ People will faint from fear and foreboding of what is coming upon the world, for the powers of the heavens will be shaken. ²⁷ Then they will see 'the Son of Man coming in a cloud' with power and great glory. ²⁸ Now when these things begin to take place, stand up and raise your heads, because your redemption is drawing near."

²⁹ Then he told them a parable: "Look at the fig tree and all the trees; ³⁰ as soon as they sprout leaves you can see for yourselves and know that summer is already near. ³¹ So also, when you see these things taking place, you know that the kingdom of God is near. ³² Truly I tell you, this generation will not pass away until all things have taken place. ³³ Heaven and earth will pass away, but my words will not pass away.

³⁴ "Be on guard so that your hearts are not weighed down with dissipation and drunkenness and the worries of this life and that day does not catch you unexpectedly, ³⁵ like a trap. For it will come upon all who live on the face of the whole earth. ³⁶ Be alert at all times, praying that you may have the strength to escape all these things that will take place and to stand before the Son of Man." P: The gospel of the Lord. **A: Praise to you, O Christ**.







Give us this day our daily bread;


and forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us; and lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil.

A NOTE ON COMMUNION WAFERS




To topple barriers that prevent participation in worship, we want to make it possible for individuals with Celiac Disease or gluten intolerant to be able to eat the Body of our Lord. Our default wafers are made by Parish Crossroads and are known as "Low Gluten Wafers" because they contain trace amounts of gluten. However, the wafers are tested at least once a year for how much gluten is in them. Since 2020, the wafers have routinely tested to contain 15ppm gluten or less (The

US FDA defines most food products with 20ppm or less as "gluten free"). Use the QR Code and look for the link that gives the most recent test results.


If you still have concerns, we have some truly gluten-free wafers available upon request.




