INTRODUCTION TO THE DAY

Widows are visible everywhere in today's readings. Jesus denounces those scribes who pray impressive prayers but devour widows' houses. He commends the poor widow who in his view gave far more than the major donors. Jesus doesn't see her simply as an object of compassion or charity. She, like the widow of Zarephath who shares her last bit of food with Elijah, does something of great importance.

P: In the name of the Father, and of the +Son, and of the Holy Spirit. A: Amen.



Unbind us and set us free. Lead us again to the waters of rebirth, that we may live just and generous lives for the good of your world and the care of our neighbors, following in the servant way of Jesus. Amen.

P: In the mercy of almighty God, Jesus Christ was given to die for us and for his sake God forgives us all our sins. As a called and ordained minister of the church of Christ, and by his authority, I therefore declare to you the entire forgiveness of all your sins, in the name of the Father, and of the + Son, and of the Holy Spirit. **A: Amen.**



WORD

FIRST READING: RUTH 3:1-5; 4:13-17

Ruth is a Moabite woman who married the son of Naomi, an Israelite. When their husbands died and Naomi returned home, Ruth accompanied her, with the prospect of starving together. But while picking up leftover grain in a field, she met the landowner, Boaz, who fell in love with her. The last verse is the surprise ending to the story – the great-grandson of the foreigner Ruth is the greatest king of Israel.

¹ Naomi said to [Ruth,] "My daughter, I need to seek some security for you, so that it may be well with you. ² Now here is our kinsman Boaz, with whose young women you have been working. See, he is winnowing barley tonight at the threshing floor. ³ Now wash and anoint yourself, and put on your best clothes and go down to the threshing floor, but do not make yourself known to the man until he has finished eating and drinking. ⁴When he lies down, observe the place where he lies; then go and uncover his feet and lie down, and he will tell you what to do." ⁵ She said to her, "All that you say I will do."


4:13 So Boaz took Ruth, and she became his wife. When they came together, the LORD made her conceive, and she bore a son. ¹⁴ Then the women said to Naomi, "Blessed be the LORD, who has not left you this day without next-of-kin, and may his name be renowned in Israel! ¹⁵ He shall be to you a restorer of life and a nourisher of your old age, for your daughter-in-law who loves you, who is more to you than seven sons, has borne him." ¹⁶ Then Naomi took the child and laid him in her bosom and became his nurse. ¹⁷ The women of the neighborhood gave him a name, saying, "A son has been born to Naomi." They named him Obed; he became the father of Jesse, the father of David.


L: The word of the Lord. **A: Thanks be to God.**

PSALM: 127

The first half of this psalm urges us to depend on God, rather than on our own hard work, for our security. The second half praises God for the gift of children, who are for the psalmist a means for providing that security. Both halves could be the song of Ruth. +






SECOND READING: HEBREWS 9:24-28

One of the themes of the book of Hebrews is how Jesus fulfills and brings to an end the sacrificial system which until the Incarnation had been how humans (Israel in particular) interacted with God. The author argues that that system and the priesthood which led it were pale reflections of Jesus, the true intermediary between human and divine, foretastes of the feast to come.

²⁴ Christ did not enter a sanctuary made by human hands, a mere copy of the true one, but he entered into heaven itself, now to appear in the presence of God on our behalf. ²⁵ Nor was it to offer himself again and again, as the high priest enters the holy place year after year with blood that is not his own, ²⁶ for then he would have had to suffer again and again since the foundation of the world. But as it is, he has appeared once for all at the end of the ages to remove sin by the sacrifice of himself. ²⁷ And just as it is appointed for mortals to die once and after that the judgment, ²⁸ so Christ, having been offered once to bear the sins of many, will appear a second time, not to deal with sin but to save those who are eagerly waiting for him.

L: The word of the Lord. A: Thanks be to God.

*GOSPEL ACCLAMATION



*GOSPEL READING: MARK 12:38-13:2

This passage continues describing Jesus' teaching in Jerusalem during the week before his crucifixion. Immediately after this story, he begins to warn of the destruction which will come upon Jerusalem and the temple (both were destroyed in rebellions in AD 70).

P: The Holy Gospel according to Saint Mark, the twelfth chapter. **A: Glory to you, O Lord.**

³⁸ As [Jesus] taught, he said, "Beware of the scribes, who like to walk around in long robes and to be greeted with respect in the marketplaces ³⁹ and to have the best seats in the synagogues and places of honor at banquets! ⁴⁰ They devour widows' houses and for the sake of appearance say long prayers. They will receive the greater condemnation."

⁴¹ He sat down opposite the treasury and watched the crowd putting money into the treasury. Many rich people put in large sums. ⁴² A poor widow came and put in two small copper coins, which are worth a penny. ⁴³ Then he called his disciples and said to them, "Truly I tell you, this poor widow has put in more than all those who are contributing to the treasury. ⁴⁴ For all of them have contributed out of their abundance, but she out of her poverty has put in everything she had, all she had to live on."

^{13:1}As he came out of the temple, one of his disciples said to him, "Look, Teacher, what large stones and what large buildings!" ²Then Jesus asked him, "Do you see these great buildings? Not one stone will be left here upon another; all will be thrown down."

L: Renew this congregation, O God. Give us clarity in our mission and boldness in our witness. Bless our ministries that attend to basic needs of any who lack sufficient resources, that all may live with dignity. Merciful God, **A: receive our prayer.**

L: Happy are those whose help was in you. We give thanks for all your faithful ones who praised you as their God all their life long especially Pat Harpster and Malcolm Hummel Sr. As we eagerly wait for you, inspire us by their lives of service. Merciful God, **A: receive our prayer.**








*PREFACE

Give us this day our daily bread;


and forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us; and lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil.




